Paper Guidelines

Page limit: full papers are recommended to be 5 pages and must be at most 7 pages long.

Text: Times New Roman, size 14, justified, without text wrapping.

Line spacing: single (1.0).

First-line indent: 1.25 cm.

Margins: 2 cm.

Figures are placed throughout the text, black-and-white with different styles of shading, numbered consecutively and captioned below, justified.

Tables are numbered consecutively (put the number above the table and apply right alignment) and captioned (center alignment).

References should be listed alphabetically at the end of the paper and include only those sources cited in the text. Please, cite the papers indexed by RSCI, Web of Science, and Scopus.

In-text citations are square-bracketed: [3, p. 255-256]. The first number stands for the number of the source in the reference list. It is followed by the number of pages.

Please, make sure your research is scientifically sound and your manuscript is formatted according to the guidelines, otherwise we will not be able to publish your paper. The organizing committee reserves the right to make a final decision on accepting papers for publication.

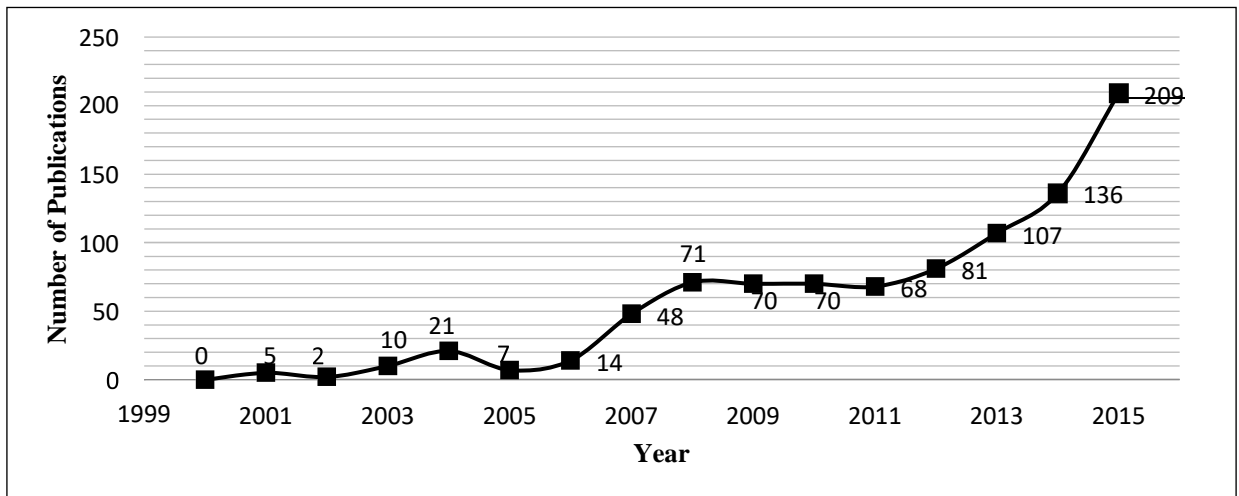


Figure 2. Dynamics on the number of RSCI publications exploring demographic safety issues (calculations: [put the number of the reference from the reference list])
